III. Discussion Questions

- What initial thoughts do you have about the book?

- If you had to summarize your understanding of the book of Revelation, what would you say it is about?
- Throughout history, people have used the term "apocalypse" to talk about the end of the world. But Dr. Betsworth reminded us that "apocalyptic literature is the story of God breaking into the world in a dramatic way and bringing an end to the cosmic struggle between God and evil." What difference does it make to understand the book of Revelation as the book of God breaking through rather than the end of the world?
- Revelation was written by John, but it's a different John than the one who wrote the gospel of John or 1 & 2 John. What difference does this make for you as you read Revelation
