I. Check-In

II. Scriptures

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. -Exodus 20:16

[Satan] is a liar and the father of liars. -John 8:44

Did You Know?

Catherine of Siena, a 14th-century Italian mystic and saint, was known for her commitment to truth, even when it meant challenging powerful leaders. At the time, the Pope, who traditionally led the Church from Rome, had moved to the city of Avignon (in modern-day France), causing unrest and division within the Church. Catherine bravely urged Pope Gregory XI to return to Rome, where she believed he was meant to lead, warning him that staying away would weaken the Church's spiritual authority. Despite the risks, her courageous truth-telling influenced the Pope's decision to return to Rome, showing her deep commitment to both honesty and faith.

III. Discussion Questions

- Rev Whitton suggests that fear often leads us to lie. What are some fears that might prevent us from being truthful in our relationships or even with ourselves? How does trusting in God help us to face these fears and choose honesty?
- Ephesians 4:15 calls us to "speak the truth in love." Can you think of a time when someone spoke truth to you in a loving way? How did that experience affect you? How can we practice this balance of truth and compassion in our relationships and daily interactions?
