II. Scriptures

In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven. -Matthew 5:14-16

Did You Know?

C.S. Lewis, or Clive Staples Lewis, was a British writer, theologian, and scholar best known for his works on Christian apologetics and the beloved Chronicles of Narnia series. Born in Belfast, Ireland, in 1898, Lewis was an atheist in his early years but converted to Christianity in his thirties, largely influenced by his close friendship with fellow author J.R.R. Tolkien. Lewis went on to become one of the most prominent Christian thinkers of the 20th century, authoring books such as Mere Christianity, The Screwtape Letters, and The Great Divorce. In these works, he explored profound themes of faith, morality, and human nature, often using imagery of light and darkness to illustrate the battle between good and evil. In The Chronicles of Narnia, for instance, light symbolizes truth, hope, and the divine presence of Aslan, while darkness often represents ignorance, fear, and oppression. Through his imaginative writing and clear theological insights, Lewis invites readers to recognize light as a transformative force, one that both guides and empowers people to reflect God's goodness in a shadowed world.

 Proportional, Tithing, and Impact giving. What challenges do you face in moving forward on this path, and how might you take a step toward the next level of commitment?

ing Path

1. Intentional Giver

Make a giving plan. Even small, regular gifts make a difference.

2. Proportional Giver

Give a percentage of your income, recognizing that all we have comes from God.

3. Tither

Aim for 10% of your income, a biblical practice that challenges and deepens our trust in God.

4. Impact Giver

Give beyond 10%, investing sacrificially in God's work to transform the world.
