Did You Know?

Walter Wink was a biblical scholar and theologian best known for his work on power, systems of oppression, and nonviolent resistance. In his groundbreaking trilogy on "The Powers," Wink reinterpreted biblical teachings on spiritual warfare, arguing that the "powers and principalities" mentioned in scripture are not just supernatural forces but also the human institutions, ideologies, and social systems that shape our world.

Wink believed that Jesus' resistance to temptation in the wilderness was not just about personal self-control but about rejecting corrupt forms of power—economic (turning stones into bread), political (ruling the kingdoms of the world), and religious (performing miracles for self-glorification). He argued that Jesus' response to these temptations models how Christians are called to engage with power: not by domination or self-interest, but through love, humility, and service.
